**Organization of the Annual Report**

The Annual Report for CHASS EEED consists of three sections: 1) an executive summary of CHASS EEED activities; 2) a copy of a Five-Year Strategic Plan submitted by the CHASS Advisory Committee; and 3) a listing of CHASS Faculty activity by realms of engagement activity set forth by *UNC Tomorrow* and by department and faculty members within CHASS.

**EXECUTIVE SUMMARY FOR CHASS EEED**

CHASS EEED accomplished a number of different goals this year. It established an Advisory Board for CHASS EEED with representation from all departments. A major task of the Board was to write a five-year strategic plan for CHASS that is proactive and visionary and at the same time realistic in light of current budgetary constraints. Suggested changes in CHASS EEED by the Advisory Committee included the reconfiguration of the present administrative structure of EEED so that it is commensurate with other administrative units within CHASS, as well as the expansion of EEED to include funding of engagement initiatives. A major goal for CHASS EEED is to enhance its visibility and promote current and future engagement activities. CHASS faculty representing all departments are highly engaged in a wide range of activities that substantively represent all of the realms of engagement set forth in *UNC Tomorrow*. More than 85 faculty members reported more than 300 EEED activities for 2008-09. These include more than 70 presentations to civic and non-profit organizations, numerous presentations to K-12 students, workshops on issues that range from communications and media relations in non-profit organizations and NC State's progressive Virtual Computing Lab to data analysis for the Gerontological Society of America, and more than 25 media appearances that include television and radio interviews, and interviews reported in the print media. Other activities included the construction of exhibitions and the production of regional and national documentaries for television, as well as the development of curricular materials for the Department of Public Instruction and for informal public education. For their meritorious service and research in engagement, CHASS faculty have achieved prestigious recognition, including an Emmy nomination, recognition as the NC Humanities Council's Caldwell Laureate, induction into the NC State Academy for Faculty Scholars in Extension and Engagement, and other local civic awards and recognition. A number of collaborative engagement grant proposals have been funded in association with other colleges and allied disciplinary groups within NC State and with local community organizations and agencies.

### Overview

As set forth in the final report of the University of North Carolina Tomorrow Commission, “UNC should become more directly engaged with and connected to the people of North Carolina, its regions, and our state as a whole” and “should develop a strategic plan for scholarly public service on each campus that is detailed and specific in definition and scope” (*UNC Tomorrow* 2007, p.3). The NC State Response to the Report noted that, despite its recognition by The Carnegie Foundation for the engagement of its faculty and students, “significant areas of university extension remain underdeveloped” and that “NC State has a unique standing to launch still more ambitious programming in extension and engagement” (*UNC Tomorrow: NC State Response*, May, 2008, p.77). It was further observed that “research and engagement is a part of the mission of all of our colleges and an integral part of every faculty appointment” (*UNC Tomorrow: NC State Response*, May, 2008, p.77). Accordingly, extension, engagement and economic development (EEED) is an essential part of the mission of the College of Humanities and Social Sciences (CHASS) that includes faculty, students, and staff.

The CHASS Extension/Engagement Task Force Report (April 25, 2008) observed that the College has had a distinguished record of outreach and engagement that has affected the lives of many of North Carolina’s citizens and communities, and that this vibrant tradition is ongoing and progressive. Multiple examples are documented in the CHASS Extension/Engagement Task Force Report and in the annual activity reports submitted by faculty members and departments within CHASS. Furthermore, these activities demonstrate an expansive range and depth of outreach that includes producing leaders for the state, nation, and world, creating educational innovation, producing documentary films and museum exhibitions, as well other community-based services and products. At the same time, there is a tradition of research on extension and engagement that links scholarly and service components.

While the prominent role of extension and engagement within CHASS is unquestioned, much of the past and present activity is based on individual faculty initiatives and responses rather than institutional programming and development. Notwithstanding several notable exceptions (e.g., the textbook publication venture in Social Studies), current extension/engagement activities within CHASS do not fall under the purview of a systematic, coordinated administrative structure. Furthermore, extension and engagement are often designated exclusively under the category of “service” when some of these activities exhibit a

strong research dimension that reflects the synergy of engagement-based “research” within the faculty mandate for scholarly research. The strategic plan for the development of EEED in CHASS set forth here is not intended to supersede or constrain the individual prerogatives of faculty members and students within CHASS currently involved in extension, engagement, and economic development. Instead, it is intended to provide an overarching administrative structure that will provide support, incentive, and recognition of the unique role of CHASS in the EEED effort, and to develop a systematic, progressive development plan for EEED within CHASS for the future. As noted above, it is based on the mandate of *UNC Tomorrow* (2007) and the NC State Response to UNC Tomorrow (2008), as well as the observations and recommendations set forth by the CHASS Extension/Engagement Task Force (2008). The plan offers a strategy that will allow CHASS EEED to develop in a way that is consonant with its outreach mission and potential while it is responsible to the current fiscal constraints. At the same time, the plan anticipates future development and growth of EEED within CHASS that will allow the College to assume its rightful role as a dynamic partner in collaboration with the citizens and communities of North Carolina and beyond.

In the following sections, we propose a five-year strategic plan for EEED CHASS that is realistic in terms of the current budgetary limitations while projecting its long-term growth and development. We also propose a new mission statement and organizational chart for the programmatic administration of EEED within CHASS.

### **Mission**

Consistent with the Land Grant mission of North Carolina State University and the College of Humanities and Social Sciences (CHASS), the CHASS EEED mission is to facilitate collaboration among faculty, students, and the citizens and institutions of North Carolina’s 100 counties to address problems and needs through engaged teaching, research and service.

### **Vision**

To establish a nationally recognized model for sustainable, mutually beneficial, reciprocal relationships between the community and university through extension, engagement, and the promotion of economic development.

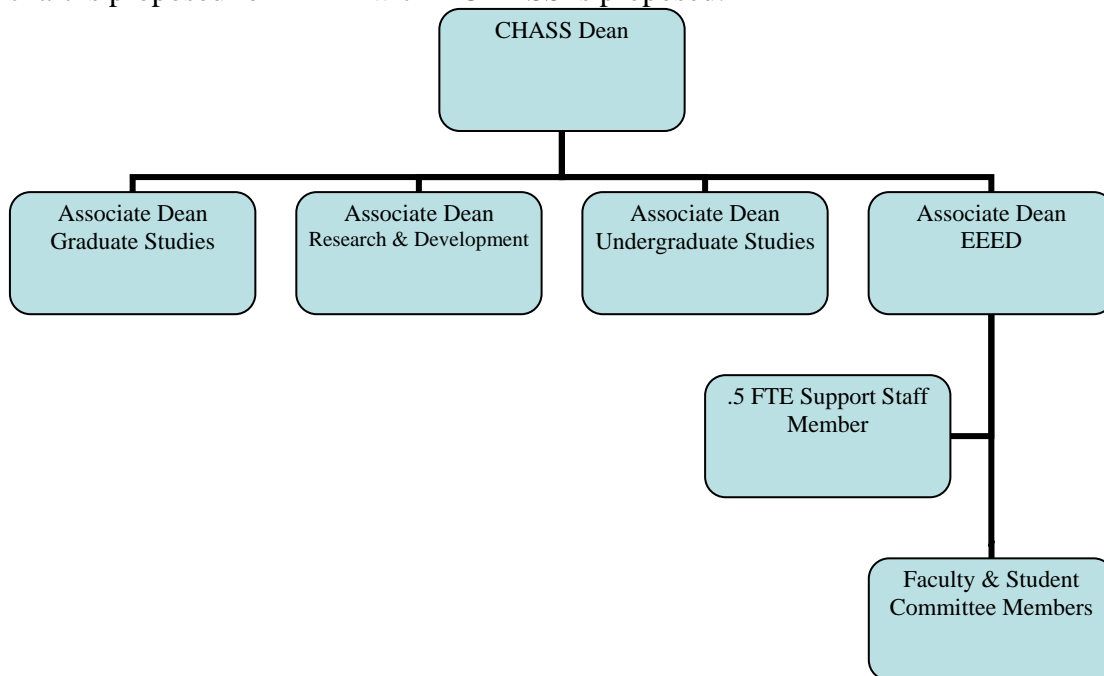
