CHASS Departments and their Degree Programs

The College of Humanities and Social Sciences (CHASS) offers 58 different undergraduate degree programs. The titles of these curricula are listed below. All majors are Bachelor of Arts unless otherwise noted. Complete lists of the most current requirements for all undergraduate curricula are available by clicking the curricula requirements link on the [Registration & Records](#) website.

IMPORTANT NOTICE REGARDING RESIDENCY AND GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS: NC State and CHASS require students complete at least 25 percent of credit hours required for graduation through courses offered by NCSU, and must have earned at least 30 of the last 45 hours of credits through NC State courses to satisfy residency requirements. A 2.0 GPA is required for graduation and D's are not accepted in any course used to meet the freshman-writing requirement.

Communication

Concentrations: Communication Media; Public & Interpersonal; Public Relations

Graduation Requirements: D's are not accepted in any COM courses used to satisfy any graduation requirement. All courses used to satisfy Departmental requirements must be passed with a "C-" or better. Students must complete at least 12 hours of Communication Concentration courses at the 300/400 level. A 2.0 in the major is required.

English

Majors: English (BA): Creative Writing; Film Studies; Language, Writing & Rhetoric; Literature (American, British and World); Teacher Education

Residency Requirements: See departmental adviser.

Graduation Requirements: D's are not accepted in the major or in the courses that satisfy the professional education requirement for teacher licensure. A 2.0 GPA in the major is required.

Foreign Language & Literatures

Majors: French; French Teacher Education; German Studies: General, Science & Technology, International Economics; Spanish; Spanish Teacher Education

Residency Requirements: A maximum of 15 hours of transfer credit may be applied toward the major. FLF/FLS 492 must be completed at NC State.

Graduation Requirements: D's are not accepted in the courses that satisfy the professional education requirement for teacher licensure, or in any course in the major, including elementary and required courses, departmental electives, and advised electives. A 2.5 GPA in the major is required for graduation.

History

Majors: History (BA); History (BS); History (BA) Social Studies Teacher Education Concentration: A five-year combined program linking BA in History and Master of Arts in Teaching

Residency Requirements: A minimum of 18 hours of history credit must be completed at NC State. Twelve (12) of the 18 hours must be at the 300 or 400 level (not counting HI 300) and must include at least one 491 seminar.

Graduation Requirements: D's are not accepted in any course used to satisfy a major requirement. LAH and LSH students must have a major GPA of 2.0; LTH students must have a major GPA of 2.5, and an overall GPA of 3.0 to enter the MAT program.

Interdisciplinary Programs

Majors: Africana Studies: General, Community Studies Concentration; Arts Applications: Film Studies, Music, Visual Arts; Interdisciplinary Studies: General (BA), General (BS); International Studies: Africa, East & Southeast Asia, Europe, International Cultural Studies, International Economy & Environment, International Relations, Latin America, South Asia & Middle East; Science, Technology & Society (BA), Science, Technology & Society (BS); Women's & Gender Studies

Residency Requirements: A maximum of 15 hours of transfer credit may be applied towards the major.

Graduation Requirements: D's are not accepted in the courses included in the major. International Studies majors must complete at least 6 credit hours in a study abroad program.

Philosophy & Religious Studies

Majors: Philosophy (BS); Logic, Representation & Reasoning (BS); Philosophy (BA); Philosophy of Law (BA); Ethics (BA); Religious Studies (BA)

Residency Requirements: A minimum of 18 hours in the major must be completed at NC State.

Graduation Requirements: D's are not accepted in the philosophy and religious studies courses taken to satisfy major requirements. A 2.0 GPA in the major is required.

Political Science

Majors: Political Science (BS); Political Science (BA); American Politics; International Politics; Public Policy; Law & Justice (Justice Systems or Law & Theory)

Residency Requirements: A minimum of 15 credit hours of PS courses taken at NCSU with a grade of C or better.

Graduation Requirements: D's are not accepted in the political science courses taken to satisfy major requirements. A 2.0 GPA is required in all major courses with a PS prefix.

Psychology

Major: **General Psychology**

Residency Requirements: A minimum of 17 hours of psychology courses must be completed at NC State.

Graduation Requirements: All courses in the major must be passed with a grade of C- or better. ENG 101 and Natural Science Requirements must be passed with a grade of C- or better. Students may count a maximum of 2 D's in other courses used to satisfy graduation requirements.

Social Work

Major: **Social Work (BSW)**

Residency Requirements: A minimum of 19 hours, including two practice courses, field preparation, and fieldwork, must be completed at NC State.

Graduation Requirements: A grade of C- or better is required in all major courses.

Sociology & Anthropology

Majors: **General Anthropology; Bioarchaeology; Criminology; Sociology**

Residency Requirements: A minimum of 15 hours in the major, including at least 9 at the 400-level or above, must be completed at NC State.

Graduation Requirements: A 2.0 GPA in all major courses is required.

Majoring in CHASS

Through its 9 departments and several interdisciplinary programs, the College of Humanities and Social Sciences offers different undergraduate majors leading to bachelor's degrees. The CHASS degree programs are listed by department on pages 5-6.

Most CHASS degree programs are Bachelor of Arts (B.A.) programs. In addition, CHASS offers six B.S. (Bachelor of Science) programs. These B.S. degrees are in: History; Interdisciplinary Studies; Logic, Representation & Reasoning; Philosophy; Political Science; and Science, Technology & Society. B.A. programs require relatively more humanities and social sciences courses than B.S. programs, which require relatively more science and math courses than B.A. programs.

CHASS also offers the B.S.W. (Bachelor of Social Work) degree.

Degree requirements are generally divided into four categories: general education program requirements, college requirements, major (departmental) requirements, and free electives. Pages 7-8 give the general education requirements for CHASS B.A., B.S.W., and B.S. degrees. Major requirements may be found online at [MyPack](#) or [Advising Central](#) website.

Additional information about majors is given on departmental websites, links to which may be found on pages 2-4. See also pages 5-6 for departmental requirements regarding residency requirements and graduation requirements.

Advising

Each student is assigned a departmental adviser, who may be a professional staff adviser or a faculty adviser. In addition, each department has a Director of Advising. Incoming students are given the names of their advisers, or may look them up on their personal [MyPack](#) Portal website. Students should meet with their adviser **at least** once a semester. Students may also consult their departmental Director of Advising, listed on pages 2-4.

Progress Toward Degree

University policy requires students to make steady progress toward completing the requirements of the degree program in which they are enrolled. Students are required to complete at least 24 credit hours toward their degree requirements each year and to consult with their adviser to produce an approved Plan of Study for the courses remaining. A planning tool available via [MyPack](#) Portal helps students plan the courses they will take to complete their requirements.

Changing Majors

NCSU students who wish to change to or add a CHASS major should consult the intra-campus transfer requirements given on page 12. CHASS students who wish to change to or add a major in another NCSU college should consult the intra-campus transfer requirements for non-CHASS majors at the Policies, Regulations and Rules web page. From [MyPack](#) Portal, students may request temporary degree audits, which show how the courses they have completed will fit into a different major.

Double Majoring

For students who are pursuing two separate degrees within CHASS, the following restrictions apply:

- 1) No more than nine hours of overlap coursework may be counted in the two majors' departmental requirements. (There is no restriction on the amount of overlap that is allowed in GEP or free elective coursework.)
- 2) A student may be awarded only one of the following degrees: B.A. in Sociology (LAS), B.A. in Criminology (SCR), or B.S. in Applied Sociology (ASA).

GRP 509 Foreign Language 201 -- CHASS offers courses in 16 non-English languages: Arabic, Chinese, French, German, Greek, Hebrew, Hindi-Urdu, Italian, Japanese, Latin, Persian, Portuguese, Russian and Spanish. Courses are listed under these course prefixes: FLA, FLC, FLF, FLG, FLH, FLI, FLJ, FLN, FLP, FLR, FLS, GRK, LAT, PER.

All CHASS B.A. degree programs require study of one foreign language through at least the first semester of the intermediate level (201-level course). French, German, Spanish and International Studies majors complete more advanced courses in the language of their major.

For placement information, high school students should take the SAT II-Foreign Language Test in the foreign language they have studied in high school. Alternatively, students may take the Advanced Placement (AP) Foreign Language or Literature exam, the International Baccalaureate (IB) Foreign Language or Classical Language exam (Higher Level), or the NC State Foreign Language Placement Test for foreign language placement.

The NC State Foreign Language Placement Test is offered in French, German, Latin and Spanish. Opportunity to take it is provided during New Student Orientation and at other times. Students may take the NC State Foreign Language Placement Test only one time in a given language.

Students who wish to complete the CHASS foreign language requirement in a language they have not previously studied are not required to take a foreign language placement test.

Native speakers of languages other than English do not receive credit for lower division (100- and 200-level) courses in their native language. For these students, a 201-level foreign language course is not a graduation requirement; their foreign language requirement is replaced by a 3-credit free elective. Students should contact Dr. Dudley Marchi, 319 Withers Hall, for waiver information.

Students must enroll in foreign language at the level at which they are placed. Students who take a 101-level course in the language of their high school foreign language proficiency will not receive graduation credit for the course. 102- and 110-level language courses may count as free electives in all CHASS curricula. Students who place into a 202-level or higher language course will have met the CHASS foreign language requirement and are eligible to receive three hours of advanced placement credit by enrolling in the course into which they are placed and earning a grade of C- or better on the first attempt.

GRP 862 GEP Mathematical Sciences -- MA 101 is a remedial course that may not be used to meet the GEP Mathematics requirement, nor for graduation credit in any capacity. MA 108 may not be used to meet the GEP Mathematics requirement, but it may be used as a free elective.

For a freshman who places into MA 114 or one of the calculus courses MA 121, 131, or 141 at NC State, taking that course at NC State and earning a "C-" or better on the first attempt will earn an extra three hours of mathematics credit. (The additional three hours of credit will not be given if a student attempts a lower level math course before taking MA 114, 121, 131, or 141 or if MA 114, 121, 131, or 141 is taken at another institution.) Programs that require Statistics as a second math course can use the extra three hours of mathematics credit as free elective credit.

Credit is not given for more than one of the following: MA 121, 131 or 141. Students will not be given credit for MA 111 if they have taken MA 107 or MA 108.

Advanced Science/Technology Option -- A 15-hour concentration in one area of science, technology or mathematics, approved by the student's adviser and the CHASS associate dean. The form for this option is available on the [CHASS Policies](#) webpage. It should be submitted and approved no later than your junior year. A total GPA of 2.0 is required in this requirement.

Registering for Classes

See Your Adviser – Returning students should meet with their advisers prior to their enrollment date. Although it is your responsibility for planning your program of study and meeting degree requirements, advisers will offer valuable advice to help you achieve your goals. Advisers are located in the department of your major (e.g. Department of History, Department of English, etc.) Your adviser will release the advising hold, enabling you to register for courses during your Enrollment Dates, as specified on [MyPack](#).

Attend Orientation - If you are an incoming freshman or transfer student, attend the appropriate, mandatory orientation session. Orientation is invaluable to you as a new enrollee at NC State, and will answer many questions you might already have concerning the enrollment process and your course of study. Complete information, including a downloadable Student Handbook and schedules for orientation sessions, are available from the [Division of Undergraduate Academic Programs](#).

Register for Classes – You will register for classes using [MyPack](#), an online, self-service application. In addition to being the site for registration, MyPack gives you access to your academic and financial (student account) records. You will need your Campus ID number and your Unity ID to register. Your Unity ID and Campus ID number are generated by the Information Technology Division (ITD). If you have any problems with either of these please call ITD at 919-515-HELP.

There are two places you can go to determine what courses are required in your degree program:

[MyPack Portal](#) -- This site includes your own Automated Degree Audit (ADA), which is based on the curriculum requirements for the major into which you have matriculated. Courses that you have already completed or that are in progress are entered on your ADA. (Important Note: Do not worry if all of your transfer credits or advanced placement credits are not entered into your ADA by the time you first register. However, if credits you believe you have earned do not eventually appear on your ADA, contact your adviser.)

[Registration & Records](#) – This website displays curricula by degree audit requirement categories. Click on Humanities and Social Sciences and then on your particular major to find your curriculum.

Progress Toward Undergraduate Degree -- All undergraduate degree-seeking students who entered either as first-time first-year students or transfer students are subject to the Progress Toward Undergraduate Degree regulation. Failure to maintain compliance with the regulation will result in the student being placed on Progress Warning status and could result in the loss of status as a degree-seeking student. Progress Toward Degree is tracked with the Automated Degree Audit (ADA) located on [MyPack](#).

AP scores and transfer credits -- Typically posted on the student's ADA at the beginning of the semester, if applicable. Check your schedule and credits carefully to ensure your schedule does **NOT** include courses for which you may have received Advanced

Placement (AP) or Transfer credit. Credit will not be awarded twice for the same course. Additional information is also available on the [Undergraduate Admissions](#) webpage.

Helpful Hints

- **Do not take any courses for credit only, unless you intend to use them as Free Electives.** You must earn the equivalent of a C- grade to receive a grade of S (D range grades are graded as U). Changes to or from Credit Only grading cannot be made after the deadline to drop courses.
- **If you are registered for fewer than 15 hours, your deadline to drop a course is census day** (10th day of classes in Fall and Spring; 3rd day of classes in Summer sessions).
- **Be aware of all university deadlines.** See the University Academic Calendar at: <http://www.ncsu.edu/registrar/calendars/index.html>.
- **If you are registered for a course and do not attend, do not assume you are automatically dropped for the course.** Check your schedule to verify that you are not registered; otherwise, if your name is on the roll you will receive an "F". This should be done before the last day to drop a class.
- **Full-time students must be registered for at least 12 credit hours a semester, and they must complete 12 credit hours a semester to comply with the university's progress toward degree policy.** To graduate in four years (without attending summer school), students must complete approximately 15 credit hours per semester (122 credits are required for graduation in most CHASS curricula).
- **Some courses are listed in the Schedule of Courses as "restricted."** Do not assume you cannot take a restricted course. If you are in doubt about a restriction, try adding the class to your schedule. MyPack Portal will not let you add the class if you do not meet the criteria.
- **Some classes are paired** (e.g., lecture with a specific lab/problem session). Make sure you register for **both** parts.
- **Do not register for courses for which you have not completed the prerequisites.** The course descriptions for each course (click on the course title to see the description) give the prerequisites that you must have completed before taking the course.
- **Graduation credit will only be awarded once for the same course.** This includes Advanced Placement credit and transfer course credit. Additionally, some NCSU courses are very similar to each other or include overlapping course material, and credit will only be awarded once. Pay close attention to course descriptions and registration information to ensure you do not register for a course that duplicates one you have already taken.
- **Any time you make a change to your schedule, double check that your desired change was processed in the manner you desired.** Often times, students think they do one thing but end up doing something different.
- **MyPack Portal will not let you register for two classes that overlap in time, even by five minutes.**
- **An "advising hold" only affects future semesters.** Such a hold does not affect access to current courses; students can make changes to current courses (i.e. drop/add, pass/fail grading) with an advising hold present.
- **Students can check their adviser on [MyPack](#).**

CHASS Academic Minors

Academic minors are not required, but may be added to enhance a student's academic program. Minors total at least 15 credit hours; they may be offered within one department or may be interdisciplinary. In order to receive credit for a minor, students must complete an application with the minor department. Students cannot earn a minor within their major field of study.

Generally, no more than three hours of overlapping coursework may be counted in a minor and a major **OR** between any two minors. However, some minors will permit six hours; please check with the minor adviser. Students must officially declare a minor by obtaining the necessary signature on the following form: <http://www.ncsu.edu/registrar/forms/pdf/minor.pdf> and submit all necessary paperwork to the CHASS Dean's Office, 106 Caldwell Hall, by the **beginning** of the semester in which they intend to graduate.

The minors listed below are offered by the College of Humanities and Social Sciences. Additional minors are available from other NC State departments. For a complete list of minors offered by the university, refer to: www.ncsu.edu/advising_central/minors.html.

A copy of the minor application must be submitted to 106 Caldwell Hall at the beginning of the final semester before graduation.
